Gateway's Responsible Fatherhood Program, located in West Liberty, KY and serving Bath, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, and Rowan counties, provides education & individual coaching to help fathers learn practical skills to reduce stress and improve parenting skills in order to be successful in long term relationships with their children. The program serves approximately 300 clients yearly, assisting them with financial literacy, job skills, and parenting education. Funding for the Responsible Fatherhood Program at Gateway Community Services is provided by a Fatherhood grant, United States Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Grant: 90FK0014.

Ben is a young man who recently completed multiple class programs with Gateway Community Action staff at a local rehabilitation facility. He has struggled with drug addiction from a young age, and as a result has never held steady employment or participated in many job interviews. As a result of these factors, he has looked at the prospect of entering the job market with a great deal of trepidation. Once he completed job coaching classes, Ben expressed a new sense of optimism when it comes to entering a world that can be frightening to even the most experienced individuals. He stated that he feels much more prepared to complete job applications and ready himself for job interviews, and that he is quite confident he can obtain employment utilizing the skills he has learned and practiced through Gateway Community Action's job coaching program.

Gateway's Healthy Marriage and Relationship Project, located in West Liberty, KY and serving Bath, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, and Rowan counties, provides education & individual coaching to help couples and singles learn practical skills to reduce stress and improve communication skills in order to be successful in long term relationships. The program serves approximately 300 clients yearly, assisting them with financial literacy, job skills, and relationship education. Funding for the Healthy Marriage and Relationship Project at Gateway Community Services is provided by a contract partnership with Kentucky River Foothills in their HMRP Grant, United States Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Grant: 90FM0050.

National Statistics by Domain

Grantee-level dimension scores are averaged to produce grantee-level domain scores. Previous large-scale studies of CLASSTM have shown that the average preschool classroom scores are higher in the domains of Emotional Support and Classroom Organization than in the domain of Instructional Support.

Winter Driving



Safe Driving and Vehicle Maintenance Are Key

Winter is a time when safe driving and well-maintained vehicles take on even greater importance. "Failure to keep in proper lane or running off the road" and "driving too fast for conditions" are two of the most frequent driver behaviors, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

In order to avoid potentially dangerous situations, the Insurance Information Institute offers the following winter driving tips:

- + Give yourself enough time to arrive at your destination. Trips can take longer during winter than other times of the year, especially if you encounter storm conditions or icy roads.
- Tring a cellphone so that those awaiting your arrival can get in touch with you, or you can notify them, if you are running late. But avoid the temptation of using the phone while driving, as it can be a dangerous distraction—pull over first.
- ♦ Drive slowly because accelerating, stopping and turning all take longer on snow-covered roads.
- Leave more distance than usual between your vehicle and the one just ahead of you, giving yourself at least 10 seconds to come to a complete stop.

 Cars and motorcycles usually need at least 3 seconds to halt completely even when traveling on dry pavement.
- ♦ Be careful when driving over bridges, as well as roadways rarely exposed to sunlight—they are often icy when other areas are not.
- Avoid sudden stops and quick direction changes.
- + Be sure to keep your gas tank full. Stormy weather or traffic delays may force you to change routes or turn back. A fuller gas tank also averts the potential freezing of your car's gas-line.
- * Keep windshield and windows clear. Drivers in cold-weather states should have a snow brush or scraper in their vehicle at all times. Your car's defroster can be supplemented by wiping the windows with a clean cloth to improve visibility.
- ♦ Do not activate your cruise control when driving on a slippery surface.
- Do not warm up a vehícle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- ♦ Keep your tires properly inflated and remember that good tread on your tires is essential to safe winter driving.















Fall Winter Energy Saving Tips

. The following tips will save you energy and help your budget as the weather cools down.

- Set your thermostat no higher than 68 degrees when you are home and lower the temperature when you go to bed or when you are not at home. This will ensure optimal home heating and save energy.
- For every degree you lower your thermostat you save about 2 percent off your heating bill.
- Cut annual heating bills by as much as 10 percent a year by turning your thermostat back 10 to 15 percent for eight hours a day.
- Weatherize your home by caulking and weather-stripping all doors and windows. Also use locks on your windows to make them tighter and draft resistant.
- Insulate or increase the amount of insulation in your attic, basement and outside walls. Also cover through-the-wall air conditioners to prevent cold air from leaking into your home.
- Reducing air leaks could cut 10 percent from an average household's monthly energy bill. The most common places where air escapes homes are: floors, walls, ceilings, ducts, fireplaces, plumbing penetrations, doors, windows, fans, vents and electrical outlets.
- Keep shades and curtains open during the day on the south side of your home to allow solar heating. Close them at night to retain heat.
- Don't block your radiators or heating vents with furniture or draperies. Keep your radiators, registers and baseboard heaters dirt and dust free. Close vents and doors in unused rooms.
- Have your heating system serviced once a year and regularly replace furnace filters. During the heating season, change or clean furnace filters once a
 month.
- Close the fireplace damper when not in use.
- Turn your water heater down to 120 degrees Fahrenheit to save money on your energy bill. If you have children in the house, this is also a safety
